### A Message from the Headmaster

The Lent Term began with very positive news. Following a rigorous inspection, the Independent School Inspectorate published their report which awarded The Leys the rating of 'Excellent' across the board. This was a resoundingly positive outcome and one of which I hope all stakeholders can be proud. These are the highest findings available but to read so many superlatives in the body of the Educational Quality Inspection was heart-warming. Academic life at The Leys continues to thrive, with Leysians seeing success in a variety of fields, including two Gold awards in recent Olympiads. We have also been fortunate to host a number of high-profile speakers which have included Old Leysians as well as other eminent professionals and academics. The careers talks in particular have been hugely valuable to our pupils with topics this term ranging from Finance and Law to TV and Film Production.

Outside of the classroom, the Music, Drama and Dance Departments have all been busy as always. There have been a number of opportunities for pupils to perform on the stage in Great Hall, such as the recent live dance show, 'Elements', and the Year 10 play, 'The It'. Regular concerts have also continued such as 'Lunchtime Live' on Friday lunchtimes, and 'Live at Balgarnie's' which are very well attended.

It is always wonderful to see Leysians making a positive contribution to the local community and this term, through the Personal Development and Leadership programme, pupils have been volunteering their time to help a number of local causes. It is particularly pleasing to see our partnership with Great Abington Primary School flourishing, with both staff and pupils contributing to their sporting programme.

The term ended with our second 'Giving Day' following the success of last year's event. The funds raised will go to support our fully-funded bursary programme and I'd like to thank everyone who contributed for their support.

### The Leys is Rated Excellent in ISI Inspection

We are delighted that following an inspection by the Independent School Inspectorate (ISI), The Leys has been awarded the highest possible rating.

Headmaster, Martin Priestley, commented: "I have great pleasure in sharing with you the <u>Inspection Report</u> published by the Independent Schools Inspectorate following their recent Regulatory and Educational Quality Inspection at The Leys School.

"Reading this report, I am sure you too will be struck by how impressed the inspection team was with the achievements and progress made by Leysian pupils. I am very proud of the pupils themselves, but I also want to pay tribute to all my colleagues – both teaching and support staff – without whose hard work in preparing for the inspection this outstanding outcome would not have been forthcoming.

"You will of course want to read the report in full, and you are warmly invited to do so. In summary, however, the School not only achieved full regulatory compliance but also secured a finding of "Excellent" in both the main inspection headings: for the quality of the pupils' academic and other achievements, and the quality of the pupils' personal development.

"As ever, there are pointers for further development and improvement and we welcome these insights. Senior colleagues and I have already begun work drawing up an Action Plan to address the report's detailed findings and recommendations, so that the process of refinement and further improvement continues apace."

Highlights include interactive elements such a site map, allowing users to explore our campus online, and a world map featuring video interviews with some of our international pupils. The School will continue to update the site constantly with our latest news, as well as regularly updating information, video content and imagery.





### **Gold Award for Leysian Physicist**

Upper Sixth pupil Mark F has received a Gold award in the 2022 British Physics Olympiad, placing him in the top 8% nationally. Isaac K also gained a Silver award, and Derek L, Kerem O and John W all gained Bronze awards.

The pupils sat the papers on 11 November 2022 and the three hours of questions challenged their range of knowledge, preparation skills, and ability. The aim of the Olympiad is to stretch and challenge the top young physicists in the country, preparing them for future study and giving them deeper understanding of the ideas and applications of physics.



Mr Harmsworth, Head of Physics, commented: "All questions required very different perspectives to get the measure of them. Time and perseverance were needed to master this challenge as they are not your everyday A Level Physics questions. The pupils have once again done very well and we are very proud of the effort they all put in to tackle the papers."

Top performer Mark has recently received a conditional offer from Emmanuel College, Cambridge where he hopes to study Engineering.

### Ella is Highly Commended in Essay Competition

Well done to Upper Sixth pupil, Ella D, who has received a Highly Commended award in this year's School Essay Competition run by the Royal Geographical Society and the Financial Times.



### **Edward Takes Gold in UK Linguistics Olympiad**

Lower Sixth pupil Edward S achieved a Gold award in the first round of the 2023 UK Linguistics Olympiad Advanced Paper, placing him in the top 5% nationally. In addition, Louisa H and Ryan Y achieved Bronze awards.

14 Leysians sat the paper on 7 and 8 February 2023 and the two and a half hours of questions challenged them to solve problems in a range of languages: Albanian, Lardil, Meroitic, K'iche' and Filomena Mata Totonac. The questions demanded a high level of inferential and deductive reasoning from the pupils as they were required to translate, transliterate, identify ideophones (words that evoke a sensory image as well as having a literal meaning) and deduce pronouns in the various languages. Edward has now qualified to enter Round Two of the competition, along with 90 others of the original 1686 contestants.



Mr Welby, Head of Classics, commented: "We had a record entry this year and the pupils further showed their commitment by applying themselves with great perseverance to what the organisers admitted was an unusually difficult paper this year. A Gold award is an exceptional achievement for Edward and I am delighted that so many other pupils were willing to take on such a tough challenge."

# Second place in the East Regional Spanish Debating Competition

Lower Sixth pupils Emily H and Egor T took second place in the East Regional Spanish Debating Competition held on 10 March. Competing against nine other schools they won the first two rounds convincingly, proceeding to the final against a team from The Perse. It was a very enjoyable experience and they gained a lot from the competition, receiving many positive comments from teachers and other participants on their performance.








### **Curiosity Week**

### Sam Regan-Asante

It was wonderful to welcome back OL Sam Regan-Asante on 4 February to meet with our Lower Sixth. He spoke to them with great insight and honesty about his fascinating career and how he made the move from school pupil to successful entrepreneur specialising in running high growth social media companies. He highlighted moments of great success but also the pressures he faced and how he made difficult decisions. His key messages were to treat everyone with kindness and respect, and to seize every moment.

### **Jeffrey Boakye**

On 21 February Jeffrey Boakye, one of the UK's leading voices on issues of education, anti-racism, popular culture and masculinity, joined us via live stream in Great Hall. The audience of pupils, staff and guests found his talk, followed by a Q&A, engaging, challenging and deeply inspiring.







# **OL Professor Tim Baker MBE and Professor Rebecca Shipley OBE**

On 22 February, OL Professor Tim Baker MBE and Professor Rebecca Shipley OBE visited to speak with pupils from across the school about their experience as co-leaders of the UCL-Ventura project. The project started with a corridor conversation at UCL and led to a team of thousands working together to develop breathing aids in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, delivering 10,000 units to the NHS within one month. The presentations were truly inspirational and finished with some engaging Q&A sessions.



### Dr Karina Jakubowicz

Dr Karina Jakubowicz led a fantastic lecture on 14 March focussing on "Language in George Orwell's 1984". Upper Sixth and Lower Sixth pupils studying dystopian literature gained incredible insight into Orwell's (sometimes contradictory!) beliefs about language and society, and the lasting influence of 1984.





### Sir Rodric Braithwaite

On 15 March we were delighted to welcome Sir Rodric Braithwaite to deliver a talk based on his latest book 'Russia: Myths and Realities' to our pupils. He offered fascinating insights from his time as British Ambassador to Moscow during the end of the Cold War, as well as sharing his thoughts on the current political situation and the future. His talk ended with an engaging Q&A with staff and pupils.

### **Swimming achievement**

Well done to Year 9 pupil Frank J who won one gold and two bronze medals at the final session of the Cambridge County Swimming Championships at the weekend. This brings his total to nine gold, one silver and two bronze across the competition. A phenomenal achievement!

### **Bath Cup Victory**

On 10 March, Upper Sixth pupils Austyn J, Chris H, Alex H and Isaac H finished in first place in the Small Schools Medley Relay event at the Bath Cup. They were awarded with the Dunelm Cup as the fastest 'Small School' in the country; the school last winning this cup in 1939.

The Bath Cup competition took place at The London Aquatics Centre in the main 50m pool. The event has been running since 1923, making this year the centenary of the competition. The boys' team qualified for the final of the Dunelm Cup having finished their heat as the fastest team. They led the final from the start with a winning time of 1:56:35, ahead of Lancing College and Cheltenham College, who came second and third respectively.



Head of Swimming at The Leys, Harriet Lee, commented: "This was a story of real resilience. These four boys have stuck together through the pandemic and lockdown, and their fourth place finish last year just spurred them on to do better. It is fantastic that the school has taken this trophy for the first time in more than 80 years, and it is testament to the hard work and dedication the pupils have shown."

### **U16s Reach Rosslyn Park Semi Final**

The Leys School U16 Rugby Sevens team successfully reached the Semi Finals of the Rosslyn Park National Schools Sevens Tournament on Wednesday 22 March. This places them in the top four from a total of 216 schools who entered the tournament; the furthest a side from the school has gone in this competition.

The tournament at Rosslyn Park has been held annually since 1939 and is the largest school rugby tournament in the world. Each year the country's top sporting schools compete in a full Cup format.

This year's tournament started well for the Leysian side, with victories over The Cathedral School Llandaff, Perins School and West Monmouth School, progressing from the Group Stage with ease. They then faced Worth School to qualify for Day Two, cruising to victory over a strong side 36-5.

On Day Two opponents were much tougher, however the team continued their streak with a 14-12 win over Trinity Croydon, a 12-10 win against Bromsgrove, and a comfortable victory over Haileybury 24-12. Another solid performance saw a 17-10 victory in the Quarter Finals against Whitgift and a place in the Semi Finals. Unfortunately, a narrow 7-10 defeat against Bromsgrove, who had qualified as best Runners Up, meant that was the end of the tournament for the team, but their performance throughout was nothing short of exceptional.

Head of Rugby at The Leys, James Clark, commented: "I cannot thank the boys enough for their attitude and approach to training and for their Herculean efforts over the tournament; they gave everything and left nothing out there. I also need to thank Mr Coe and Mr Murray for being the ultimate professionals and giving the boys their absolute best.

"They set the highest standards in all that they did, and when they combine that with their incredible ability, it is no surprise they performed as well as they did. I am so proud to have coached them and count myself very lucky to have been part of their journey."




### **Great Abington Primary School Partnership**
