A Message from the Headmaster

As we reach the end of the academic year, it is good to look back on all we have achieved over the past term.

This year our English Department launched the Minerva Prize, a new essay writing competition open to pupils in Year 11 and above. The standard of essay writing was very high and the process will stand applicants in good stead when applying to more competitive universities. Next year's competition has already been announced and for those interested in taking part, I would recommend giving this some thought over the summer break.

Following the success of last year's Greenpower electric car project, pupils from across the school have been working on improving the performance of the vehicle, redesigning more than 50% of components to make it lighter and more aerodynamic. This year they returned to the Lotus test track and recorded a one-lap improvement over last year. An excellent achievement and testament to the work put into the project by all involved.

There have been a number of initiatives this year focussing on environmental responsibility. One such initiative which I very much support is the decision no longer to provide single-use water bottles for school trips and at fixtures. Instead, we are encouraging pupils to fill their own bottles at one of several newly installed water fountains. This initiative was led by the pupils in the Sustainability Society and I commend them for their dedication to see this through.

Outside of school, I was delighted to hear that Noah T has signed his first professional contract for Essex County Cricket Club. This is richly deserved and I look forward to watching him progress in his career. There have also been some notable successes from Leysian musicians: Oscar S has been awarded a scholarship to the Royal College of Music Junior Department to study trombone, and Theo G has secured a place on the coveted National Youth Jazz Collective Summer School.

Looking ahead to next term, following the success of Sir Stephen Hough's piano recital, we are thrilled to be welcoming pianist, Benjamin Grosvenor, and violinist, Hyeyoon Park, to The Leys in November. This will offer another amazing opportunity for pupils to experience another professional recital from musicians at the top of their game.

Minerva Prize

In a prizegiving ceremony held on Thursday 11 May, the first Minerva Prize was awarded to Year 13 pupil Ben TB. Year 12 pupil Josh W took second place and Jess N, also in Year 12, finished in third. The competition invited pupils to submit essays on a topic of their choosing to be judged by Fellow at Clare College, Ian Burrows.

Ben's winning essay focussed on Emile Zola's novel *La Bête Humaine* looking at its critique of the Second French Empire. Josh investigated George Orwell's *Animal Farm* and its exploration of power, and Jess looked at how Madeline Miller's *Circle* presents the patriarchal attitudes of Ancient Greece. Our guest judge commented on how the essays demonstrated the type of independent study he would hope to see

in undergraduate pupils. Named after the Roman Goddess of Wisdom, and sponsor of the Arts, medicine and Crafts, this prize offers an exciting opportunity to celebrate and explore the links between various disciplines and areas of study.

Aimed at Leysian pupils in Years 11, 12 and 13, entrants were invited to submit a 2,000 word essay on a title of their choosing. Entry was open to all pupils, but those hoping to apply for the more competitive universities were encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to show research, analytical skills and the ability to make connections between academic subjects and how they are interrogated in works of literature – novels, drama or poetry.

The trophy, created by our DT Department, and prize money donated by an Old Leysian were handed out at the School prize giving at the end of the Summer Term.

Putting a Lid on Plastic Waste

In a significant move towards environmental responsibility, The Leys is proud to announce its latest initiative, aimed at reducing plastic waste and promoting sustainability. Effective from the start of the Summer Term, the school will no longer distribute single-use water bottles on school trips and at sports fixtures. Instead, pupils are encouraged to fill up their own reusable bottles at any of the seven newly-installed water fountains. This is expected to prevent the consumption of more than 10,000 plastic bottles annually, furthering the school's commitment to eco-conscious practices.



Driven by the passionate efforts of the pupil-led Sustainability Society, this initiative is part of a broader endeavour to enhance sustainability at The Leys. Recently, the society has also been actively exploring sustainable practices in the fashion industry and has successfully organised clothing swaps, allowing pupils to donate unwanted garments and acquire new ones in exchange. The Sustainability Society is commended for spearheading this campaign and for continually raising awareness and emphasising the significance of sustainable action throughout the entire school community.

Headmaster, Martin Priestley, commented: "As a country, we use and dispose of 7.7 billion plastic bottles each year. By no longer supplying single use water bottles to pupils, we can make a small step in helping to reduce this number."

The Leys has recently joined the 'Let's Go Zero' campaign, a nationwide movement that includes more than 2000 schools. By taking part in this initiative, schools must pledge to achieve Zero Carbon emissions by 2030.

The school remains dedicated to cultivating environmentally conscious pupils and is continually seeking new avenues to drive positive change in the local and global community.



Tife Wins Young Financial Journalist Competition

Year 10 pupil Tife Y has won The London Institute of Banking & Finance (LIBF) and the Financial Times (FT) Young Financial Journalist competition in the 14-15 age group category. Judges commended her essay commenting that her submission contained "strong arguments, punchy prose, excellent data and notes."


The competition is open to pupils aged 14 to 19 and invites them to submit articles on set questions. This year's topics included financial tactics to cope with the cost of living, what young people can do to avoid falling victim to scams, and how financial institutions help to tackle climate change.

Tife chose the topic of a cashless society and said: "I'm really pleased that I entered the competition. The topic posed an interest to me and I wanted to learn more about where society was moving ahead and whether a cashless society is something that will happen, so I thought it would be a fun thing to research."

This year, the panel of judges included: Money and Wealth Editor at the FT, Stefan Wagstyl, Maths teacher, author and broadcaster, Bobby Seagull, and Managing Director of Financial Education and Community Outreach at LIBF, Catherine Winter, who comments: "This year the standard for the competition was incredibly high. There were so many great articles that stood out, which made it very interesting and fulfilling to judge.

"It's always interesting to hear about young people's thoughts on money. Reading these articles, it is evident that so many young people are passionate about finance and the future of the industry."

Tife's entry will now be published on the Insights section of the LIBF website and may also be included in a feature on the FT website and/or in FT Money. She also receives a £150 cash prize.







As well as playing for The Leys 1st XI, he plays his club cricket for Sawston & Babraham Cricket Club in Cambridgeshire, who were crowned as the East Anglian Premier Cricket League Champions last year. The 2022 Academy Player of the Year will wear the number 8 shirt for the Club and will be available for selection against Ireland this week.

On signing his contract, Noah said: "I'm delighted to sign a rookie summer contract with Essex in the next step of my career development. After becoming an established member of the Academy, I have enjoyed stepping up to Second XI cricket after making my debut two seasons ago. Signing a rookie deal is a really special moment and I'm really looking forward to the season ahead and taking my opportunities."

The offer was made after a successful audition in March. Oscar will study with Ruth Molins and Richard Ward, playing bass trombone in their Symphony Orchestra, and tenor trombone in a brass quintet and/or dectet. He was also offered places at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, and the Royal Academy of Music, but decided that the RCM was the best fit.

Head of Junior Programmes at the RCM, Miranda Francis, commented: "Oscar is a naturally talented player whose playing shows enormous potential. He makes a wonderful sound and is clearly a versatile musician. The ability to play both tenor and bass trombone in the profession is considered something of a superpower, so Oscar will be well placed to take music forward if he wants to.

"It gives me very great pleasure to offer Oscar a place at the Royal College of Music from September and look forward to working with him at the RCMJD."

Director of Music at The Leys, Max Kenworthy, added: "This is tremendous news and a fantastic opportunity for Oscar! He clearly played well and impressed them, so this is very much deserved after his hard work."

Legal Skills Workshop

On 8 May our Lower Sixth pupils attended a very informative talk on higher education delivered by Lauren Ness, the Student Recruitment Officer for the University of Stirling. Lauren talked about the process of choosing and applying for university, answered questions about the UCAS process and provided an invaluable insight into studying in Scotland and, in particular, life as a student at the international campus University of Stirling.

Medical Ethics Workshop

On 28 April more than 60 Lower Sixth and Year 11 pupils attended a Medical Ethics workshop, representing a wide range of Cambridgeshire schools and colleges.

The workshop was ably led by our guest speaker, Dr Zoe Fritz, Consultant Physician and Wellcome Fellow in Society and Ethics, University of Cambridge, with the support of a team of volunteer medical students and doctors who facilitated the



group case studies. Pupils took part in group discussions, debating real medical ethical dilemmas and issues faced in practice, which led to some lively discussions. A wide range of topics were covered during the afternoon including whether assisted suicide should be made legal, if doctors should have to be vaccinated against Covid 19 and whether it is ethical to give patients who are responsible for their health condition a lower priority for treatment.

Lower Sixth Skills Workshop

In June pupils in our Lower Sixth took part in a series of workshops designed to prepare them for later life. Sessions included cooking, self-defence, driver awareness and UCAS, as well as working on business pitches. 
